## **STRONG KIDS CAMPAIGN**

The YMCA of Arlington's Strong Kids Campaign is the annual fundraising effort that allows the Y to make its programs and membership available to everyone, regardless of ability to pay. During 2009, Campaign Chairs, Lance Winter and Chris Ringel helped a crew of volunteer fundraisers secure nearly \$400,000 in donations! This tremendous result, added to other fundraising efforts, helps the YMCA give more than \$600,000 in funding directly back to the community in financial assistance and program support each year.

Planning is already underway for the 2010 campaign. Shirley Cox, Arlington Market President for Frost Bank, and Bill Bowie, Owner and Founder of Resin Technologies, will lead the charge. They are busy assembling additional volunteer leaders for their team. The theme for 2010 will be: "The YMCA Dream Team: Helping Strong Kids Live the Dream!" Using the basketball tradition of the YMCA (basketball was founded at a Y) and taking advantage of the energy in our community as it plays host to the 2010 NBA All-Star Game, campaign leaders will dribble, shoot and score their way to a campaign victory in 2010.

"The goal of the campaign for 2010 is to help the Y meet the tremendous needs in our community by helping to fund financial assistance for thousands of youth, adults and families who can most benefit from Y services," said Shirley Cox, who's acting as the Dream Team's head cheerleader.

Bill Bowie added, "The YMCA makes such a tremendous difference in our community, and I'm excited about helping to lead the Dream Team this year. We're going to make sure the YMCA continues to change lives in Arlington and Mansfield!"

# ON GOING PROGRAMS

## A Summer Full of Fun at the YMCA

Summer is always a busy time at the YMCA of Arlington, and this past summer was no exception! From summer day camp to swimming, from Dive-In Movies to youth sports, there was always something fun to do at the Y.

### Summer Day Camp

More than 450 kids attended summer day camp at 6 sites throughout Arlington. Thanks to donations to the Strong Kids Campaign, nearly one-third of these campers received financial assistance so that their working parents could provide them with quality summertime care that they would otherwise be unable to afford.

In July, all the Day Camp locations came together for a day of celebration and lighthearted competition at the annual YMCA CampTacular. At this event, the camps compete in camp games, like the three-legged race and capture the flag, to see who is tops in the Y. Awards were also given for spirit and team work. It was hot outside, but the competitors didn't even notice. They only knew that YMCA Day Camp is COOL!

## Artisan at Rush Creek Apartments

The Artisan at Rush Creek Apartments in south Arlington had been identified by the Arlington Police Department as one that had a high incidence of police calls for crimes that are typically associated with youth with a lack of alternative activities or supervision. Since the YMCA began programming there during the summer of 2008, reported crimes at this location have gone down significantly to nearly non-existent!

Throughout the summer, we continued to offer our Teen Leadership Council and Tween Leadership Council programs, as well as other activities to encourage youth to make wise and healthy life choices. We also expanded our programming there this summer and began providing lifeguards at the complex pool so that it could remain open for more hours during the hot Texas summer. We even hired one of our teen program participants to work as a lifeguard onsite. We also offered free swim lessons through The Urban Swim program, providing water safety skills to about 85 children and youth at Artisan and throughout Arlington.

In addition, the owners of this complex asked the Y to expand programming to the adjacent complex, which they now own. The Rush Creek Apartment complex is twice the size of Artisan, with twice as many residents. The YMCA is truly making a difference with the youth and teens and their families who live in this neighborhood in south Arlington.

## Summer Sports, Specialty Camps, and Nights Out

Each summer the YMCA of Arlington hosts many specialty camps focusing on a specific sport or activity. This past summer, children participated in basketball camp, soccer camp, volleyball camp, cheer and dance camp, and so much more!

We also hosted the younger kids at Little Learners camps with different weekly themes. From "Trash Camp," where participants used old newspapers and shopping bags to make artistic projects and learned about our environment, to "Chef Camp," where they learned to make simple snacks and meals, the YMCA Little Learners had a blast!

At Camp Skyline held at the North Branch YMCA, special needs kids had the opportunity over six weeks to go on a Surfin' Safari and to venture back in time to the Land of the Lost. The kids enjoyed arts & crafts time and participated in lots of sports and healthy activities while building friendships and having fun!

Girls Night Out at the Y was also a big hit this summer. Tween and Teen girls came together for one evening to enjoy lots of girlie fun. They learned how to make jewelry, put on makeup and care for their skin, to make a cool scrapbook and some great dance moves! Girls Night Out was such a success that it's now become a regular occurrence at our Central Branch YMCA!

## 21st Century Learning Centers A Collaboration with AISD

The Arlington Independent School District approached the Y last spring and asked us to work with them to provide summer programs at some of their schools. Our staff jumped in and offered lots of fun activities for youth and teens where programs had not been available before.

At Carter Junior High, Bowie High School, Barnett Jr. High School, Lamar High School and Webb Elementary, the YMCA brought youth and teens together for four weeks, offering courses in film making, providing opportunities to learn about and experience community service, to learn about and prepare for college and their careers, and to experience camping. From rock climbing to working at Mission Arlington, these youth and teens experienced a summer to remember.

Thanks to the success of these programs, the YMCA has been asked to continue and expand programming for at least 12 Arlington schools during the school year. We will work with the schools and their staff members, as well as with students from the University of Texas at Arlington, to provide sports programs, teen programs, YMCA Youth & Government and more throughout the school year. We love working with our great community partners to make our city an even better place!
